## 2. A Gift from our Bounty.

This year Global Women's Project, the Church of the Brethren and many others around the world have faced grief in the loss of our beloved sister and brother, Louie Baldwin Rieman and Phil Rieman. It is in Thanksgiving that we remember their life of love, service, and devotion to peacemaking and empowering women around the world.

Global Women's project recently received a gift from Northview Church of the Brethren in the memory of Phil and Louie. Phil and Louie were co-pastors at Northview, and spent much of their life in service of others, including the people of Sudan. Because of this generous gift, the Sewing Cooperative in Narus, Southern Sudan will be able to purchase eleven sewing machines. When GWP Steering

Committee member, Nan Erbaugh, visited with the group in Jan. 2009, the thirty women, who have been meeting weekly since 2007, shared that all of their sewing had to be done by hand. They were hoping for ten to twelve machines so they could sew items more quickly. They will now be able to purchase eleven! Because Northview Church of the Brethren graciously shared memorial funds, Phil and Louie Rieman's passion for the well-being and empowerment of the women of Sudan continues. ## 3. Kenyan Peanut Soup

Tired of the same old Turkey n' Stuffing for Thanksgiving fare? Consider doing a "More with Less" Thanksgiving meal (in the spirit of the *More with Less* cookbooks). Give an international theme by highlighting the cuisine of one country or go fusion by combining many different foods from many different cultures.

But at the Thanksgiving table, or any other table during the week, this Kenyan Peanut Soup will please everyone (unless you have a peanut allergy).

Kenyan Peanut Soup (Extending the Table, Herald Press)

Combine in heavy 2-3 qt saucepan

1 qt. chicken, beef, or vegetable stock

2 medium onions, chopped

2 medium carrots, sliced
(option, small pieces of winter squash or sweet potatoes)

Bring to a boil. Cover and simmer 30 minutes Remove from heat and puree until smooth.

Return soup to saucepan and add: 1/4 c. uncooked rice 1/2-1 teaspoon salt

Bring to a boil. Simmer, covered, 15-20 minutes until rice is tender. In small bowl, mix until blended ½ C of the soup ½ C peanut butter

Stir peanut mixture into soup along with

1 teaspoon Tabasco pepper sauce (optional)

Cover and simmer 5 minutes. Thin with water if too thick. Add additional salt if needed.
